ST IVES CHAMBERS DIVERSITY DATA: **SUMMARY REPORT FOR PUBLICATION 2022**

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Introduction

St Ives Chambers is required by the Bar Standards Board to publish an anonymised summary of its diversity data in respect of all barristers and staff every three years. The data analysis last took place on 30 November 2018. The collection of the data detailed within this report took place in November and December 2021.

We have a total of 100 barristers (including silks, juniors, door tenants and pupils) and 19 members of staff. For the purposes of this data collection exercise, the response rate for barristers was 79% and the response rate for staff was 95%.

Under previous guidance (when the data was last collected and published), we were not required to include any data relating to the protected characteristics of sexual orientation and religion/belief as consent was not obtained from all barristers and staff. However, that guidance has now been amended and, as such, that data is now published for the first time.

If a response was not received from a member of chambers or staff, we have excluded their statistics from the analysis contained herein. As such, the data detailed below is drawn from positive responses to the questionnaire only.

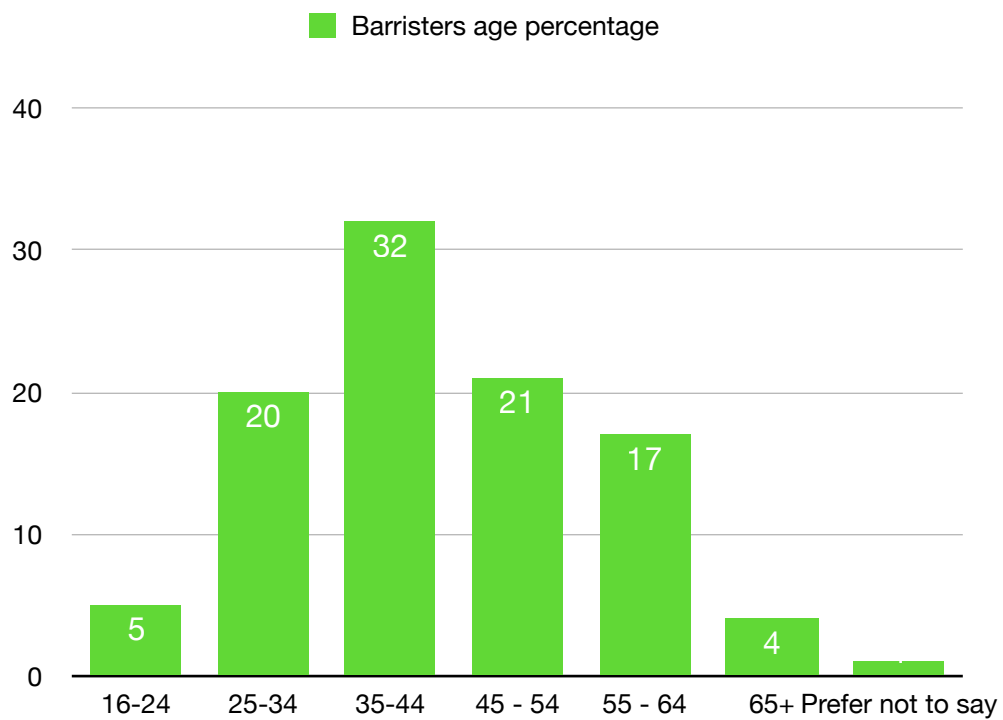
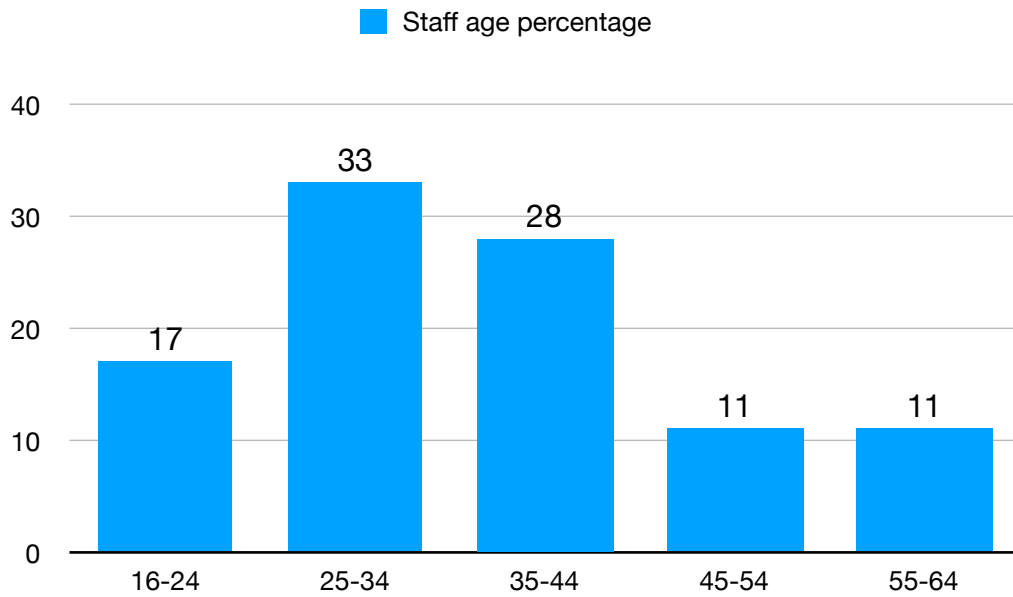
Where any individual who responded to the questionnaire objected to their data being published absolutely, their data has been excluded from the published analysis.

Where any individual has objected to the publication of their data when it may lead to identification by virtue of there being fewer than 10 individuals identified against one or more of the characteristics, this data has been excluded from the published analysis.

Every effort has been made to categorise data so as not to lead to the identification of specific individuals.

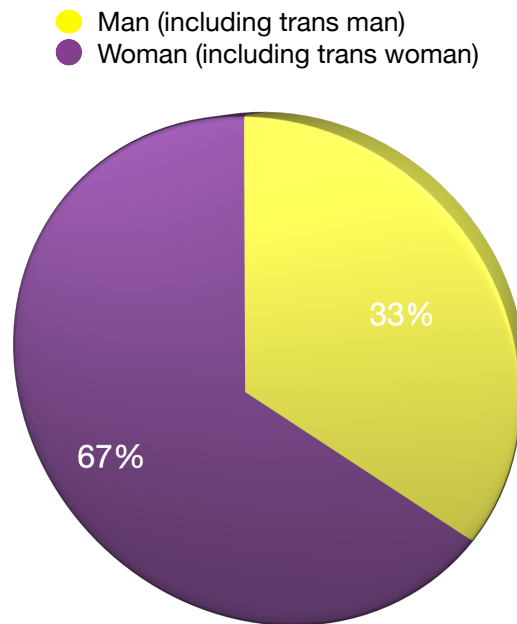

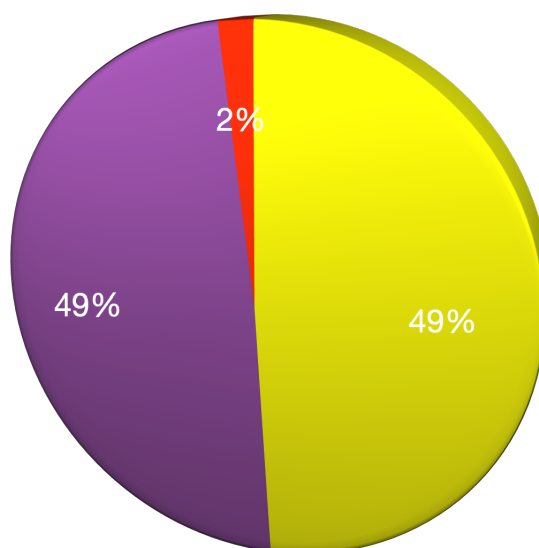


Gender

Staff gender percentage

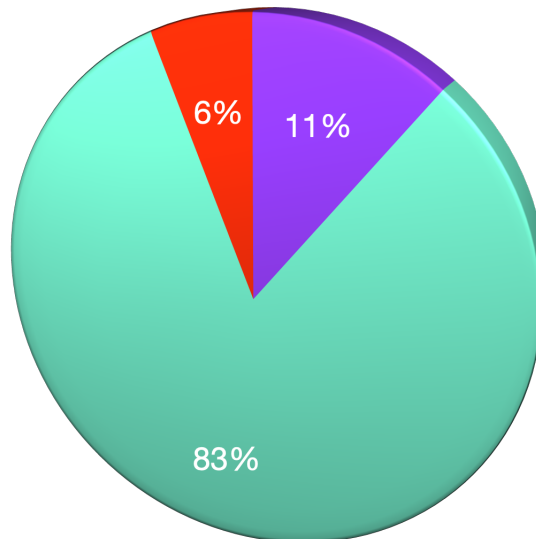


Barrister gender percentage

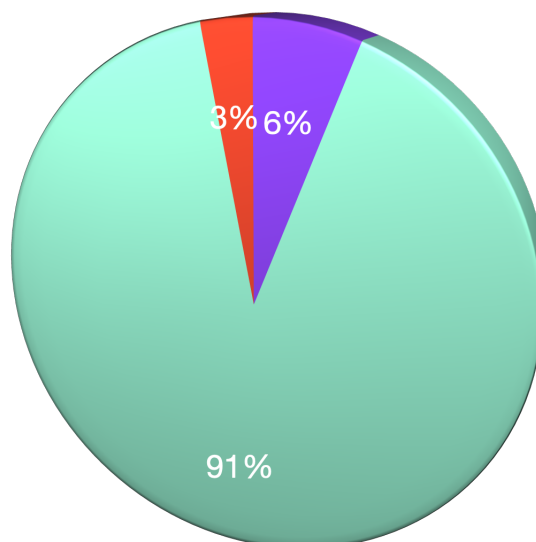
Do you consider yourself to have a disability according to the definition in the Equality Act?

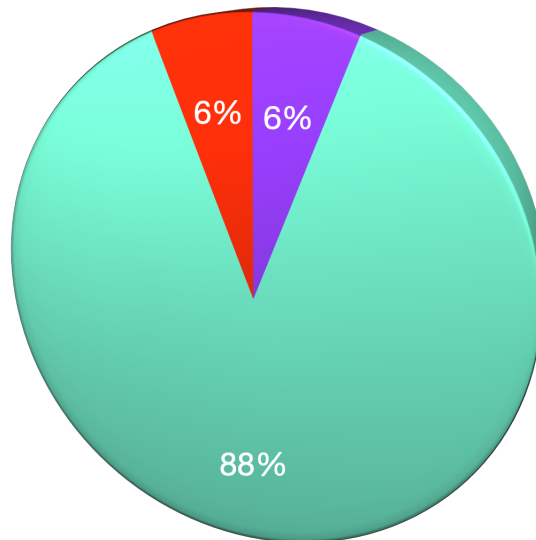

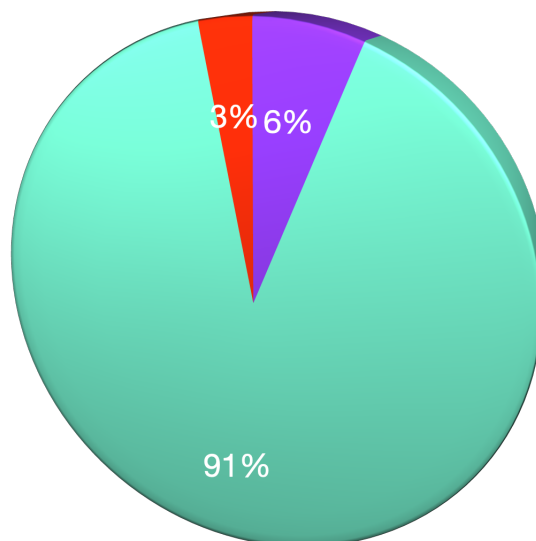
Are your day-to-day activities limited because of a health problem or disability which has lasted, or is expected to last, at least 12 months?

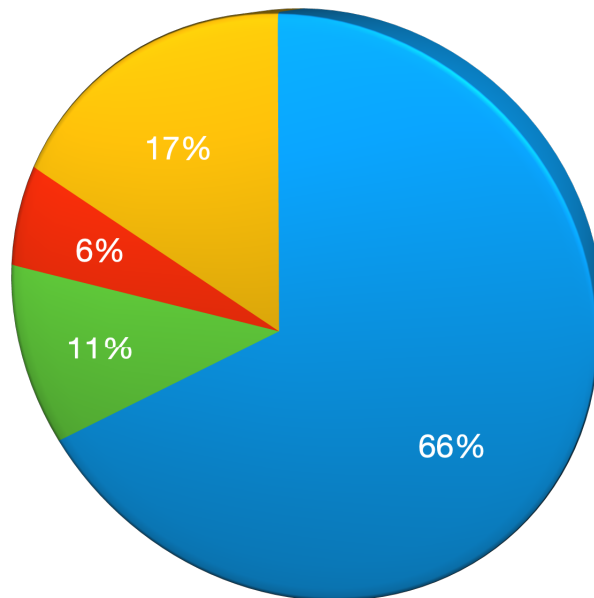


Barrister disability (b) percentage

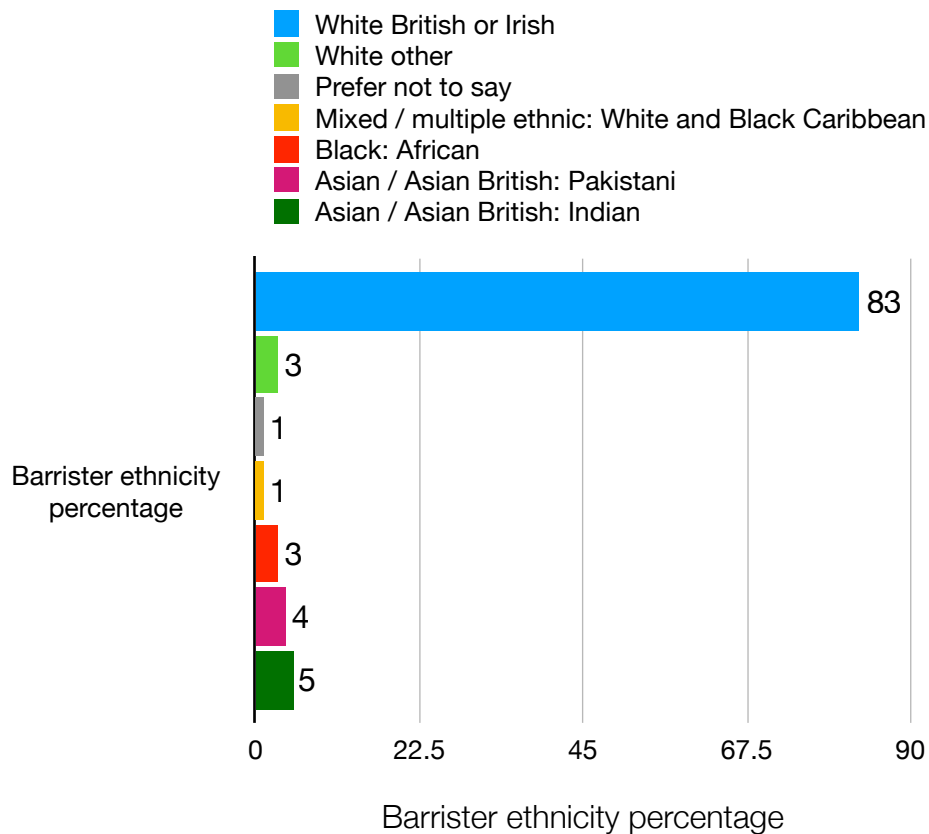

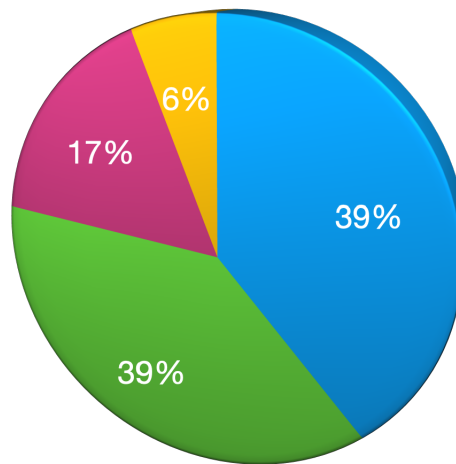
Staff ethnicity percentage

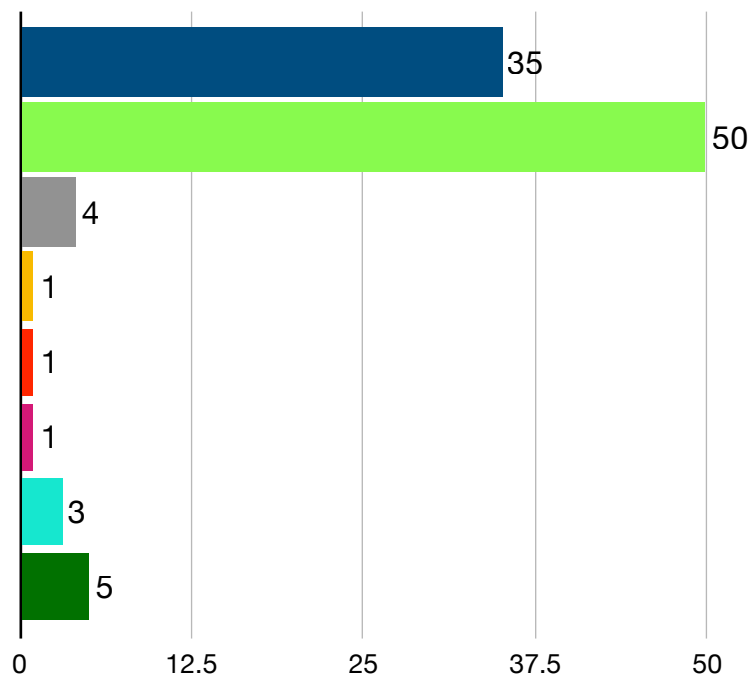
What is your religion or belief?

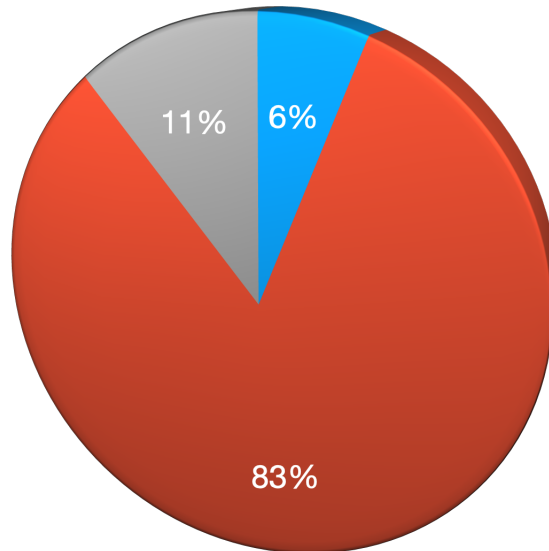


Barrister religion percentage

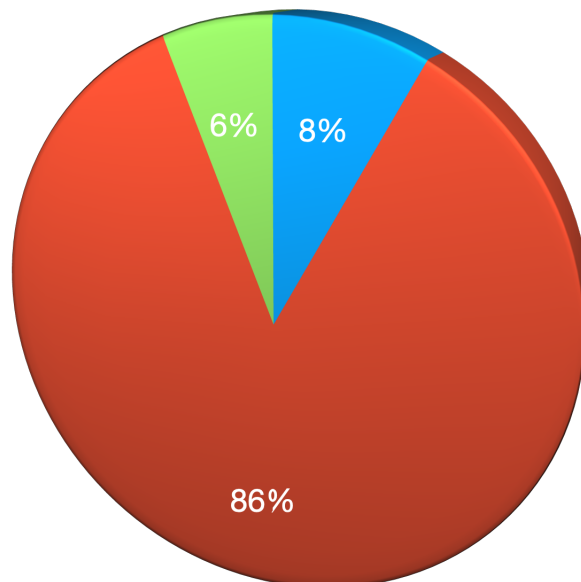
What is your sexual orientation?

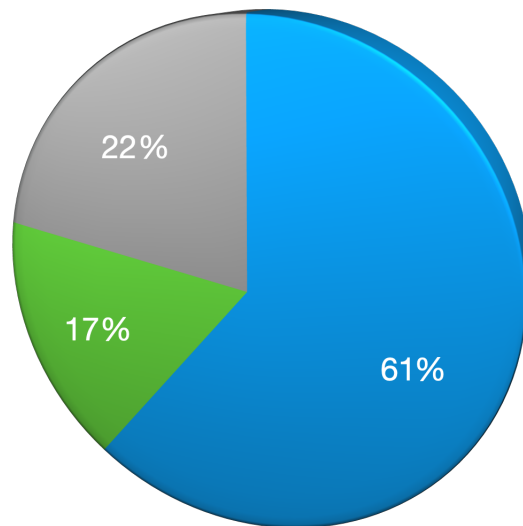


Barrister sexual orientation percentage

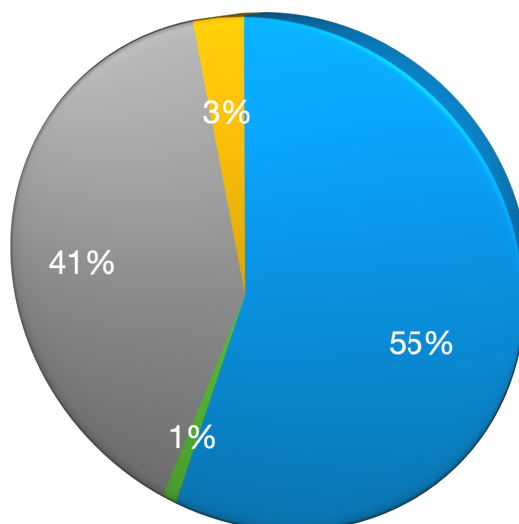
If you went to University (to study a BA, BSc course or higher), were you part of the first generation of your family to do so?

Staff education (a) percentage

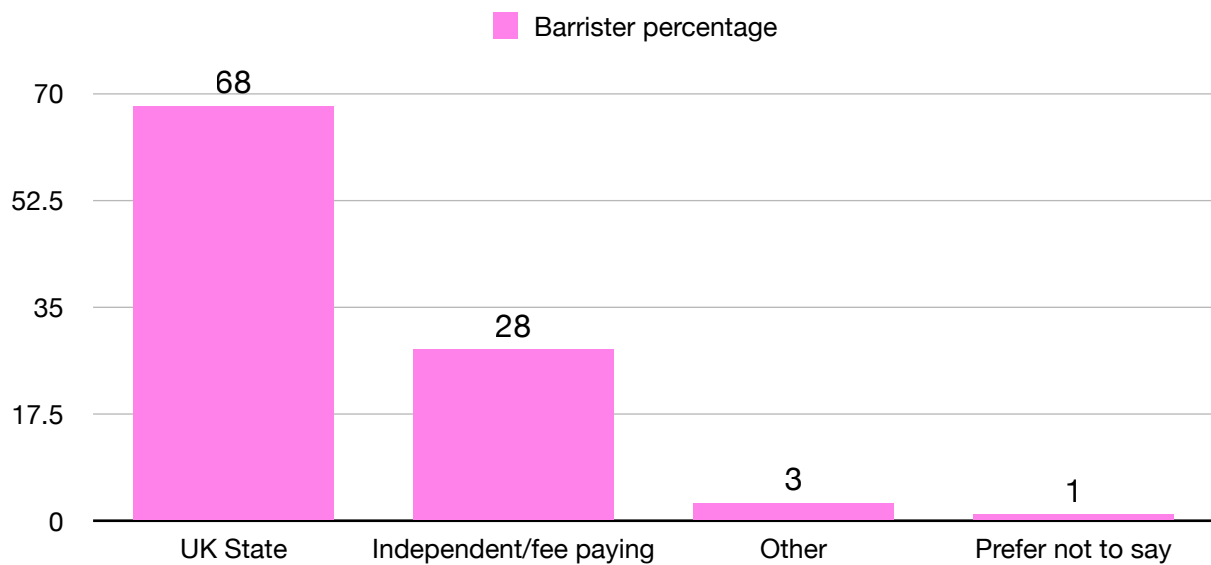
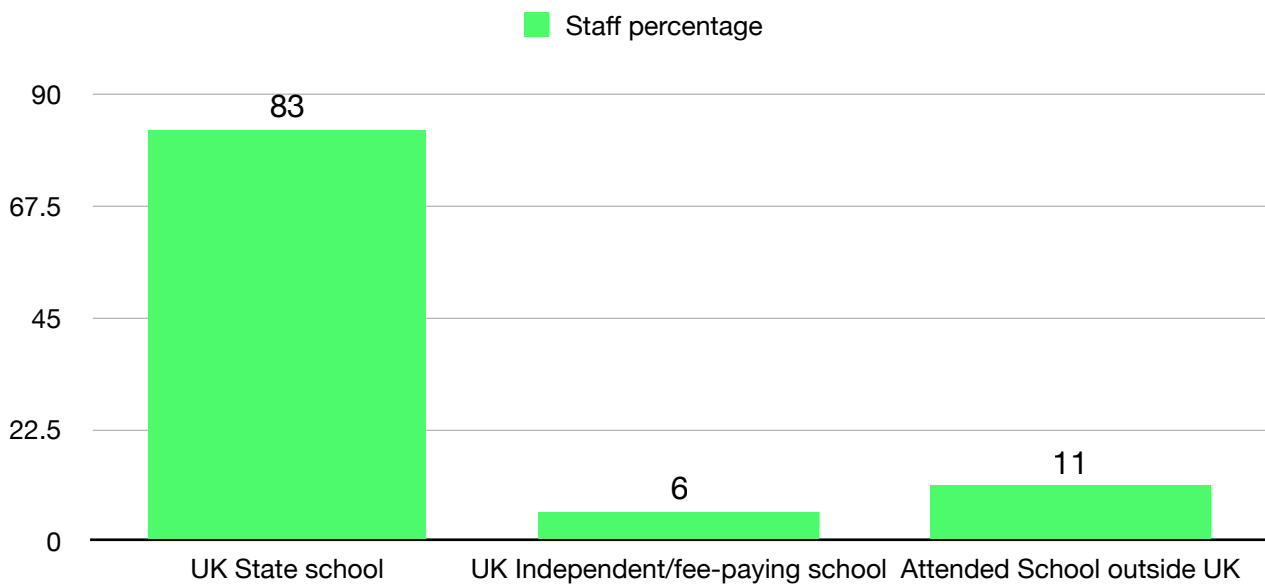

Barrister education (a) percentage

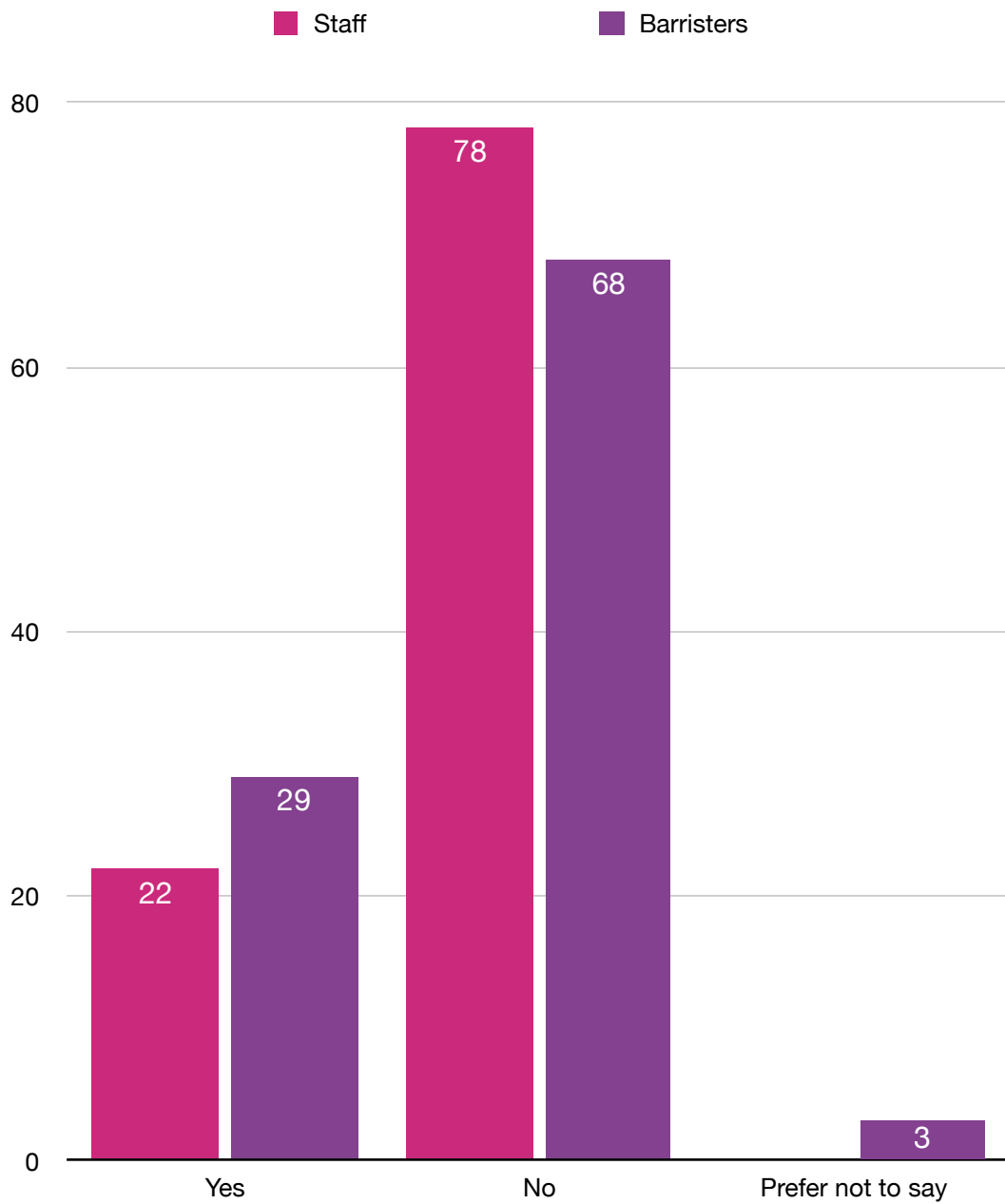
